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Delta Chapter Marks The Passing Of A Centenarian

Clifton William Bolieau '25, 1902-2002

You may have seen in the latest issue of Rensselaer magazine that Clifton Bolieau '25 celebrated his 100th birthday on May 15, 2002. We thought this deserved further recognition in the Delta Dial, so we contacted his son to get permission. Tragically, though, he informed us that Clif died in late October. But his son said that Clif was always so proud of belonging to Theta Chi that he knew Clif would have loved to have been so honored. Most of what follows was excerpted from a newspaper article written about Clif. We mourn his passing, but envy his extraordinary life.

Clifton William Bolieau was born in Springfield, Massachusetts, on May 15, 1902, to Dello Joseph and Elizabeth Williams Bolieau. He graduated from Springfield Technical High School and in 1925 from RPI with a degree in civil engineering. While there, he was a member of Theta Chi and lettered on the ice hockey and football teams.

Clif later did graduate work at New York University and the University of Tennessee and the Industrial College of the Armed Forces. He was a licensed professional engineer in New York and Tennessee.

In 1928, he and a fraternity brother, "Buck" Beehler, toured Europe by bicycle, covering over 2,000 miles.

Clif married Ivy Fisk in June 1930. They had one son, Christopher, in 1933. After Ivy died in March 1970, Clif married Mary Lee Brown the following June. Mary Lee died in August 2000. During both of their long terminal illnesses, he took responsibility for their care. Clif had two grandchildren and four great-grandchildren, a stepson and four step-grandchildren, and seven step-great-grandchildren.

Having worked for a consulting engineering company in New York City until 1942, Clif accepted a position with the Tennessee Valley Authority. He remained there until retiring in 1967. During his 25 years with TVA, he worked in the purification of water for all applications. In the early 1950s he was considered by many in his field to be the "world's leading authority" on condenser circulating cooling water for coal-fired steam power plants. In 1959, Clif prepared the complete specifications for the first hyperbolic cooling towers built in the United States.

Clif began singing in his church choir in 1912 and continued for the next 88 years. He was a member of the Knoxville Male Chorus, two music study clubs, and the St. John's Cathedral Choir. He also played the



trombone and was a leader in the Boy Scouts and the Explorer Scouts.

He held the rank of commander in the United States Public Health Service Reserves. He was also a fellow of the American Society of Civil Engineers, a diplomat of the American Society of Sanitary Engineers, and a patrolman of the Rensselaer Alumni Association.

Clif continued to garden until he was 98. He was an excellent cook, with homemade bread his specialty. He was also a creative wood crafter, making intricately carved

tall case clocks. When his wife wanted to take up weaving, he designed and built a four-harness hand loom and carved the shuttles out of solid walnut. He became an expert in the repair of antique clocks.

Facing mandatory retirement at age 65, Clif bought a sports car. He took up painting and attended classes at the University of Tennessee, as well as getting private lessons. Within two years, his work was accepted for a one-man show at a Knoxville art gallery. At the beginning of his second marriage, Clif purchased a 28-foot sailboat and became a skillful sailor, as well as an instructor at the Concord Yacht Club and the Power Squadron. Early in their marriage, Clif and Mary Lee took several cruises and twice rented larger sailboats with other couples and sailed the Caribbean, with Clif as captain and navigator.

Until suffering a heart attack in September 2000, he was still an active member of the St. John's Cathedral choir (Knoxville), the RPI Alumni Association, and various music and sailing clubs. He moved to Brigham City, Utah, in March 2001 to be near his family and lived at an assisted living facility until his death on October 25. A memorial service was held at his son's home, and the ashes from his cremation were interred in Knoxville.

Chapter President's Report

With Hard Work And Alumni Support, Chapter Bounces Back

Alumni Brothers of Delta Chapter,

I am very pleased to be writing another *Dial* article as president of Delta Chapter. I am currently finishing up my second term in office and getting ready to graduate from RPI this December with a degree in computer science.

Since this is my last *Dial* article and I am one of the few current brothers to have been around for the past five years, I thought this would be a good time to take a quick look back. Pledging began for me my freshman year in fall '98; our pledge class consisted of 20 guys. We had a great rush and were excited about becoming brothers. However, when I was home on Christmas break I began to hear news about a possible hazing event involving the brothers. Rumors started circulating that we would not be able to pledge in the spring, or, even worse, the chapter was going to be shut down.

Beginning in the second semester we were prohibited from interacting with the brothers; and then we had to undergo interviews conducted by the National's Risk Management Committee even though we hadn't even started pledging. Things were very different after the reorganization in April—the brothers felt cheated, angry, and irritated, and we freshmen were also upset. We felt that we would never be allowed to become brothers of Delta Chapter, that what we looked so forward to was now being taken away. Although things felt different, the brothers who remained in the chapter were determined that Delta would survive. Those brothers and many alumni took the time and made sacrifices to keep the house alive while the numbers were low. At the end of fall '99 what was left of my original pledge class was finally initiated, and we moved into the house in fall '00.

There were 19 of us living in the house that semester, and it was hard. During rush our freshman year we had witnessed Monday night football games with 60 guys there, dinners were always full and alive, and there were always people in the living room just hanging out. Some fraternities on campus would love to have 19 guys living in the chapter house, but in a house built for 55 brothers, the house appeared empty. However, we worked hard not to make it feel empty. Instead of brothers staying in their rooms, we always tried to congregate in the public areas. If five brothers missed dinner, the dining room was almost empty, so we all kept 7:00 to 7:30 p.m. free to eat dinner as a group. We had one goal in mind: to get Delta Chapter back to the top. We worked hard that year, and with the help of some key alumni we pledged 17 new brothers.

Things were looking up in the fall of '01, but we still only had 27 brothers living in the house. There was plenty more work to be done. At the beginning of that semester we made a list of goals. The list was long and involved many different areas, but our two most important ones were to rush high-quality guys and to regain the traditions and ideals that we had heard so much about. Eighteen pledges became brothers that year, and we now have 36 chapter members living in the house. Most importantly, though, we are only losing four brothers to graduation this year.

That brings us to the present. We have just had another successful fall rush. The chapter was extremely enthusiastic about rush this year, getting a head start over the summer and continuing the momentum once classes began, making rush the number-one priority. In the end, our hard work was rewarded, and it is with great pleasure that I tell you that 20 bids have been signed. This exceeds our pledge class last year of 18. The soon-to-be 2003 pledge class is an outstanding group of young men, ready to keep alive the traditions of Delta Chapter of Theta Chi. When those pledges move into the chapter house next year, that should bring us close to 50 brothers living in. We are all very proud of this progress, and we

Continuing Support Is Always Needed And Appreciated

While the support received to date from our alumni has been impressive, it still pales in comparison to the ever-increasing financial needs of our undergraduate brothers. Based on the estimates of RPI's Financial Aid Office, the full cost (tuition, books, room and board) of an RPI education will exceed \$38,000 in the 2003-2004 school year. Most financial aid packages are tight in the freshman year, and it only gets

worse; because once an aid package is awarded to a freshman, it typically stays at that level for the next four years, despite increases in the cost to attend RPI each year. The availability of our alumni scholarships to juniors and seniors in Theta Chi, which is in addition to their RPI aid package, is often the difference in being able to return to Rensselaer or not. are able to do strategic planning and also to cover leadership and management topics, permitting the actives to benefit from the life experience of their alumni brothers.
