Alumni Programs Committee Looks To New Year

The Alumni Programs Committee, after its first year of operation, can reflect on many successes. For instance, *The Delta Dial* continues to flourish, with a good balance of alumni and active chapter news. Alumni were involved in the spirited regional convention at Delta and the gala 75th anniversary celebration. A productive alumni corporation meeting was held last May. The number of contributors to the alumni giving campaign jumped up an astounding 43 percent! Addresses were continually updated. All in all, eight of the committee's original 13 goals were met.

But a new year means moving ahead, and more needs to be done to promote support of Delta Chapter and the brotherhood of its alumni. We need more class coordinators to help maintain *The Delta Dial*, more alumni to attend this year's corporation

Delta Chapter Institutes New Bond Program

In 1953, "Dusty" Rhodes started a "bond program" to raise funds for the construction of the present Theta Chi fraternity house at 2100 Burdett Avenue. These bonds were purchased by alumni and carried the very modest return of two percent interest. They were, in fact, loans almost interest-free, which substantially reduced our need to seek mortgage money.

These bonds have been sold primarily to alumni who were graduated before 1960. They are being redeemed at a rate of \$1,000 (40 bonds) per year, based on a lottery-type drawing, as agreed when the bonds were sold.

There are approximately 920 bonds, with a value of \$23,000 still outstanding. Almost half of these bonds are owned by RPI, having been donated by their purchasers. Other bonds have been donated to the Helen and "Dusty" Rhodes loan fund.

It is now time to accelerate the payoff of the bonds and to have our more recent graduates take over some of the load.

We are offering a new series of bonds, paying five percent interest. As these bonds are sold, the proceeds will be used to pay off the earlier bonds.

The new \$25 bonds will be designated Series B and are available for sale immediately in units of four, at \$100 per unit.

Brothers Plan And Execute House Improvements

During the summer and fall, several plans for improvements to the Theta Chi house were developed. Completion of these improvements has been deliberate due to their high cost in relation to the budget.

One project in the construction stage is a walk-in refrigerator-freezer for the kitchen. After discussions with E. G. Marshall Refrigeration Consultants, we are currently working with local contractors, and construction should be complete by the beginning of the spring semester. The walk-in will save money in the number of compressors used and, more importantly, will replace the refrigerators and freezers that are constantly being repaired.

Still on the "to buy" list are a mixer/food processor, a new chandelier with side lights, and a new front door mat to replace the one that was stolen.

Discussions about a senior gift from the classes of '83, '84, and possibly '85 are under way. One idea being considered is the replacement of the living room rug. Although purchasing a new rug is not final yet, we have set a deadline to have the gift in the house by mid-March.

House maintenance projects being done include minor plumbing and appliance repair. We will probably have the main lines "Roto-Rootered" soon, since we are overdue for a water backup. Other than some general maintenance, the house is being kept up well. John Forster '85 is monitoring the roof, which was repaired in 1982, to ensure that the same problems do not recur.

If you have any input concerning house improvements or projects, please feel free to send suggestions.

By-Laws Changes Proposed

The following are proposed changes to the by-laws of Delta Theta Chi Corporation. These changes will be voted on at the May 1984 corporation meeting.

The changes are intended to clarify the make-up of the board of directors and the manner of selecting officers. They also change the requirement for holding meetings of the board.

These changes submitted to the membership are in accordance with Article VII, Section 1, of the by-laws.

The recommended changes are:

BY-LAWS — DELTA THETA CHI CORPORATION

Proposed Changes

Article II, Section 1

The Board of Directors shall consist of 6 members elected from the general membership at each annual meeting. The term of office shall be one year.

In addition, the President, Vice-President, and Treasurer of the active chapter of Theta Chi Fraternity at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute shall be members of the board of directors during their terms as officers of the undergraduate Chapter.

Article II, Section 2

The officers of the Corporation shall be a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, and Secretary. They shall be elected by the board of directors for 1-year terms.

The officers may be elected for not more than 3 consecutive 1-year terms.

Article IV, Section 2

Regular meetings of the Board of Directors will be held at least once per school semester at R.P.I.

Delta Chapter's 75th Anniversary Celebration Caps An Already-Successful Alumni Weekend

Despite horrible problems with the delivery of the summer issue of *The Delta Dial*, 1983's Alumni Weekend attracted more than 250 alumni, guests, and national officers. In addition to the usual alumni events, of course, we enjoyed the celebration of Delta Chapter's 75th anniversary.

The activities started out on Friday night with the fourth annual alumni hockey game, although not without problems. The renovation of the Field House was just far enough along to allow an abbreviated game (in fact, the ice had just been put down for the first time that morning). Thought has been given to having a game against another house this year—more on that in a later issue.

Saturday morning found the class of '73 and wives gathered for a 10th reunion brunch at the Holiday Inn in Troy. Fourteen of 18 brothers attended (from as far away as Houston and San Francisco) and carried on the tradition started by the class of '72 last year. Saturday's weather was beautiful, but the afternoon was not kind to the RPI football team, as it lost to a surprising Stonybrook team. The cocktail party was held later—this year under a gala tent on the front yard due to the expected large crowd for dinner inside. The meal itself was once again excellent, and the new guests were amazed at how well the brothers cook for and serve such a large crowd. This year was especially difficult due to the uncertainty regarding the number of guests; the brothers were even prepared earlier in the week to serve a buffet if necessary. (This problem of estimating the number of returning alumni gets more difficult every year. We should all start making a special effort to notify the brothers of our intentions.) The evening wound down with music and drinks in the party room, as well as

last-minute efforts at wrapping up the fourth annual Carpenter Award. Congratulations for another super effort!

Instead of the usual brunch on Sunday morning, a short coffee and doughnut hour preceded the 75th anniversary ceremony. Among the special guests were Theta Chi's national president, the officers of the executive office, representatives of RPI and the Rensselaer Alumni Association, and Mrs. "Dusty" Rhodes. Mike Bartikowski '84 began by giving a brief history of Delta Chapter's various residences and distributing a booklet filled with tidbits of Delta Chapter contributed by many alumni of all ages. A congratulatory letter from George Low, RPI's president, was read, and another letter was presented from Lee Wilcox, vice president for student affairs. The Rensselaer Alumni Association was not to be denied, presenting a beautiful plaque and congratulatory resolution.

Howard Alter and Dale Slivinske of the executive office both delivered remarks on their years of happily working with Delta Chapter, and Theta Chi Fraternity Citations of Honor were presented to Jim Bryce and John Forster for their dedication and loyalty to Delta and Theta Chi for more than 40 years. George Kilavos, national president, concluded the program with some stirring words on Delta's contributions to Theta Chi Fraternity, both by the general chapter and by the individual service of such outstanding alumni as George Chapman and Earl "Dusty" Rhodes. The ceremony was a fitting tribute to Delta's first 75 years, as well as a proud starting point for the next 75.

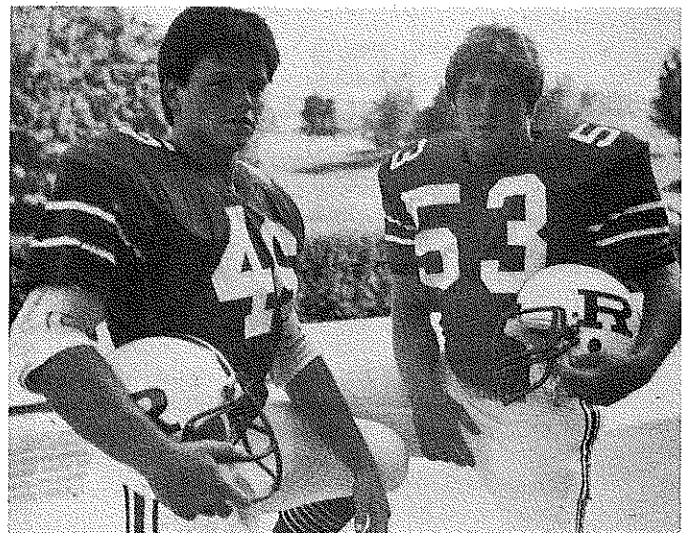

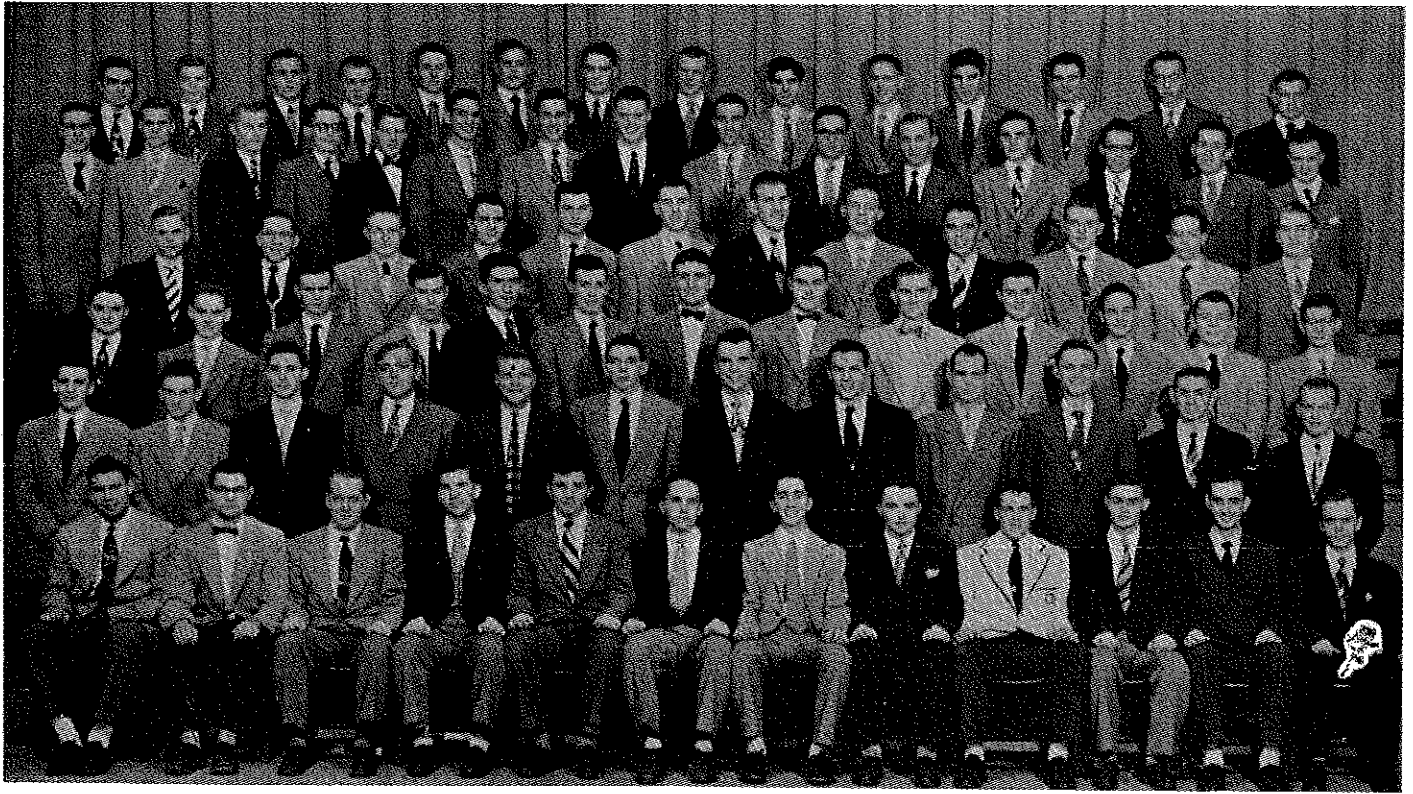

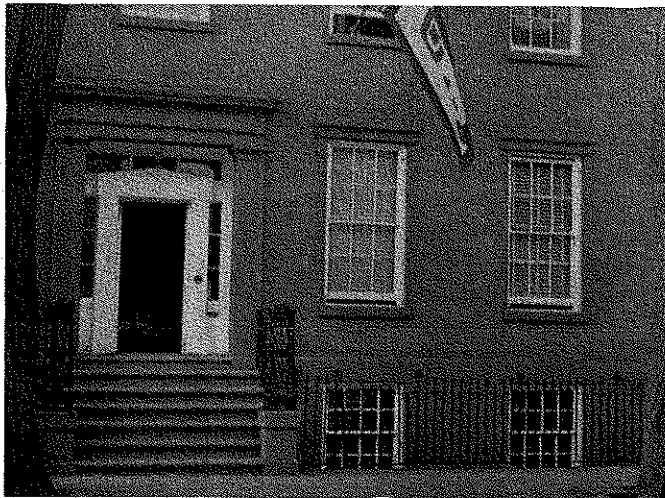
Football captains Don Patria and Tom Hersey
